




Notes

Eugene O'Neill was born in 1888 in New York, the son of Irish immigrants. During his first seven years, the family accompanied the father, who was an actor, on tour. Then O'Neill was sent to a Catholic boarding school. The father was an alcoholic and his mother abused morphine, which she received as a painkiller when Eugene was born. Addiction is a recurring theme in O'Neill's works and he himself had terrible problems with alcohol abuse. Before his breakthrough as a playwright, O'Neill lived an itinerant life. He mined gold in Honduras, worked at sea, and had short-term jobs in Buenos Aires.

When O'Neill began writing for the stage early in the twentieth century, American theatre was dominated by Vaudeville and romantic melodramas. Influenced by Strindberg, Ibsen and other European playwrights,



During the 1920s he was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for three of his plays, and other popular successes, including *Desire Under the Elms*, brought him international acclaim. In a career spanning three decades he wrote nearly sixty plays, most of them tragedies, and in 1936 he was awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature "for the power, honesty and deep-felt emotions of his dramatic works". He died of pneumonia in 1953 and his masterpiece *Long Day's Journey into Night* was posthumously awarded a Pulitzer Prize in 1957. He is the only playwright to have won four Pulitzer Prizes for Drama.



Directed by Jez Minns - Jez has been a Masker for nearly thirty years now. Mostly he is known as an actor, but he has also done a fair bit of directing, once for the Maskers, when he directed the lighthearted one-act comedy, **Sharks in the Custard**, and in his twenties for various companies in the Midlands. He directed **The Sons of Light**, by David Rudkin, an amazing large-cast tragedy and a huge undertaking. He also directed the farce, **Can't Pay! Won't Pay!** by Dario Fo, Dickens' **A Christmas Carol** and Ibsen's **Peer Gynt**, the latter winning Pick of the Week in the Scotsman newspaper when he took it to the Edinburgh Fringe. When Jez is not doing theatre, he spends his time painting and sketching and writing poetry.

Due to illness, Jez has had to step into the part of Peter. Get well soon, Matthew!

Gill was a founder member of Maskers, along with her husband Graham, back in 1968. She continued to be active in the company, with props, costumes and set dressing being her specialities. Indeed she was due to be part of the props team for this production when she fell ill and quickly succumbed to a particularly aggressive cancer.

A dedicated primary school teacher, Gill excelled at crafts and had a meticulous eye for colour. She particularly enjoyed dressing the Studio for Christmas.

Gill had a sharp wit and a lively sense of humour. She will be remembered for her kindness, her sense of fun, her craft skills — particularly calligraphy, her cooking, her organisational skills, being a wonderful wife, mother and grandmother and for generally being a lovely, warm human being. She will be greatly missed.

The Cast



Abbie Cabot played by **Emma Kirkpatrick** — Emma has had a keen interest in performing since she was very young. She was part of an amateur dramatic theatre group when she lived in Devon during her teenage years and then went on to gain a degree in Drama and Theatre Studies at Aberystwyth University. After Emma moved to Southampton, she joined Maskers in 2021 and made her debut performance in *Out of Focus*. Since then, she has appeared in *The Three Musketeers*, *Blue Remembered Hills* and *Cash on Delivery*.



Ephraim Cabot played by Duncan Randall — Duncan is involved in various community theatre groups in Southampton. Duncan joined the Maskers in 2022, playing Athos in *The Three Musketeers*. Since then, he has appeared in *The Picture of Dorian Gray*, *Gormenghast*, *Time and Tide*, *Blithe Spirit*, *Murder in the Studio*, *Romeo and Juliet*, *Blue Remembered Hills* and, most recently, *Absurd Person Singular*. It has been a challenge to play Ephraim for, although Duncan is also old and grumpy, that is where the similarities end. As Duncan says, "When you are playing a nasty piece of work like Ephraim you have to find some redeeming aspect, even if it is buried somewhere, out in the fields, with all those stones".



Eben Cabot played by **Neil Forster** — Neil joined Maskers in 2021 and has since made appearances in *Romeo & Juliet*, *The Picture of Dorian Gray*, *Almost*, *Maine*, and *Four Weddings and an Elvis*. Most recently he could be seen as a collection of quirky characters in this year's production of *Notes from a Small Island*. A native Geordie (ish), Neil grew up in South Shields and has been moving further and further south since he left school. Next stop: Isle of Wight!



Simeon Cabot played by **Iain Shaw** — This play marks lain's 2nd performance for Maskers, having made his debut in last year's, *Blue Remembered Hills*. Prior to his work with Maskers, Iain was part of the Blag It theatre Company and starred in an internet audio sitcom and a series of audio plays he produced for charity. When Iain isn't treading the boards, he can be found hosting stage events and interviews, walking his dog, Willow, and hosting podcasts. Iain is also a carer for his mother in his hometown of Romsey.



Peter Cabot played by Jez Minns — Jez has appeared in many Maskers' shows over the years. He was last seen in Blue Remembered Hills, when he played the tragic and ill-fated Donald and as the irascible Lord Capulet in Romeo and Juliet. Other recent performances include Mr Jenkins, the fuddy duddy benefits inspector in Cash on Delivery, the corrupt Lord Henry Wotton in The Picture of Dorian Gray and the drunkard Borachio in Much Ado About Nothing. When he isn't doing theatre, Jez enjoys painting and sketching and writing poetry.



Musician played by **Alan Fitch** — Alan learned the violin at school but then stopped playing for 25 years until taking it up again by joining the Northwood String Orchestra in Southampton in 2007. Alan is now the Chair of the Northwood String Orchestra and plays in the first violins. Alan also plays folk music (on both violin and hammered dulcimer) with the Southampton Folk Orchestra. Alan is a volunteer at Southampton Hospital Radio, and it is via a friend there that he was asked to play the fiddle (a.k.a. violin!) for **Desire Under the Elms**.
